AZ WOMEN TAKE NEW YEAR FEST

The Phoenix Hohuckam didn't attain the glorius heights of their female counterparts, but they did very well nonetheless. The Hohuckam started the tourney as a third seed. Their first game was against the Seattle Tribe who had combined with the Canadian national champs, Calgary. Seattle was the second seed, so this was likely to be the Hohuckam's best chance to move up a division. The Hohuckam played tough, and put on a small comeback to beat the northern combo. The rest of Saturday went according to schedule. The Hoboys stomped the Pitzer Braineaters and were beaten by South Bay and Santa Barbara to put them in the Division II quarterfinals against Philadelphia's Group Therapy. Their showdown with the Philly team proved to be less than therapuetic, as the game degenerated into a call fest and got just a trifle ugly. Nonetheless, the game will stand as an memorable one, not for its ugliness, but for an awesome comeback by the Hohuckam. In a game to 15, the Hoboys found themselves down 11-14. With imminent doom hanging over them, the Hohuckam put together 4 straight points to take a 15-14 lead. Philly gathered themselves to take a 16-15 edge. The Hohuckam tied it back up at 16 to put the contest into sudden death (cap at 17). With the Hoboys pulling, the final point saw 3 turnovers before the local squad put it in to take the win. The glory of that win will stay with those who earned it, but the Hohuckam's next opponent, Houston, wasn't impressed, as they topped the local boys 13-8 in the Division II semifinal.

Overall, it was a great tournament and the local players gave terrific accounts of themselves. combined and went by the clever name El Paso/Las Cruces, and Tucson, sporting their new identity, "Vatos Locos", put 2 teams together for the event.

The Hohuckam Kachinas started Saturday against the Vatos Locos B-team. The VLB's put up a good fight, but the HK's cruised to a 13-2 victory brandishing a vicious transition game that took advantage of the HK's big guns, Sam and Brian. Next up for the HK's was the El Paso/Las Cruces team. EP/LC had a first round bye due to lack of promptness, but were on time for their 2nd round meeting with the HK's. Unfortunately, they didn't take time to eat their Wheaties, and they went down quickly 13-2. Third round action put the HK's against the Vatos Locos A-team. VLA had thumped Santaquerque 13-8 in round 1, so the HK's hunkered down for a big showdown. The contest didn't live up to expectations though, as the HK's dropped the VLA's rather handily 13-7. As had been the standard throughout the day, the HK's victimized their opponents with tough defense and a brutal transition game. Round 4 pitted the HK's against Santaquerque. The HK's lost Mosh for the SQ game due to work, and by the time they were able to outfit a pick-up from the league, Doug Calvert, they found themselves down a whopping 8-1. At that point the HK's began a furious comeback. Doug came in and promptly made a sweet diving biff and rambled into the endzone to complete the stuff and score. Before long, the HK's had closed the gap to 10-7. At 10-7, the HK's turned the disc over in the endzone and SQ gathered themselves and went on to put down the HK uprising 13-8.

Sunday, the HK's met EP/LC in the semifinals and once again put them down handily. VLA beat SQ in the other semifinal to set the final with the Vatos Locos meeting the Hohuckam Kachinas for the coveted Uomo Donna title. The first half of the final saw the HK's take a slim lead and maintain it. The Vatos combatted the dynamic HK long game with safe, methodical marches for their scores. With the HK's leading 10-7 the tide turned. The HK's came down with acute droposis complicated by throwawabia, while the Vatos continued to make safe, smart passes. The Vatos went on an impressive 10-2 run to win the championship 17-12.
